The faculty evaluation process has been completed. Your feedback is below.

- Overall, Dave is doing a truly outstanding job in our classrooms and his work should be recognized as outstanding. Dave is continuously improving his classes by incorporating student feedback. He also uses technology very effectively in his classes, as well as guest speakers, especially in MGMT 53100. He works hard to set these speaking opportunities up.
- Dave also taught MGMT 20100 (Introduction to Management Accounting) and MGMT 35100 online in the summer. His willingness to help with our summer offerings is also very valuable.
- Dave taught four different courses, two of which are required courses for accounting majors (one of these is also required for all Krannert students) and two of which are electives, for a total of 24 credit hours during 2018. The courses ranged from MGMT 20100, an MAI course, to MGMT 35100, a required course for accounting majors, to MGMT 53100 and 59000, both of which are elective courses. Dave continues to an outstanding job in the classroom as reflected by his teaching evaluation scores and through his development of courses that are valuable to our students. He was an Outstanding and Distinguished Teacher for every course he taught throughout the year, and he won a Krannert Excellence in Undergraduate Teaching Award.
- The two electives that Dave has developed were particularly well received by the students. His Accounting Ethics course (MGMT 59000) received overall course scores of 5.0 and 4.8 and overall instructor scores of 5.0 and 4.9 across his two sections. The scores for the organization/preparation question and the in-class explanation question were also 5.0 and 4.9 in his two sections. His Government/Non-Profit course (MGMT 53100) received overall course scores of 4.9 and 4.9 across the two sections, and overall instructor scores of 4.9 and 4.9. The scores for the organization/preparation question and the in-class explanation question were 4.9 in all sections. These are important courses for our students, and Dave developed both of them from scratch. The GPAs do tend to be quite high, but that is likely the result of Dave effectively engaging the students and delivering the material well.
- A major part of Dave's teaching load is MGMT 20100, Introductory Management Accounting. Dave taught four large lecture sections during the academic year and a smaller online section in the summer. Dave was the instructor for the course and as a result designed it so that he delivered the lectures and offered TA office hours. When Dave delivered all of the lectures, his overall course scores were 4.7 and 4.6 (program mean was 4.2), and his overall instructor scores were 4.9 and 4.7 (program mean was 4.4). The organization/preparation scores were 4.9 and 4.8, and the in-class explanation scores were 4.9 and 4.8. GPAs were 3.19 and 3.38. Dave's scores were exceptionally good given that MGMT 20100 is such a large, required course.

- Dave stepped up to help out with teaching the same course in the fall due to the unexpected, mid-May retirement of the previous instructor assigned to the course for that semester. Because of the late resignation date, the course had already been structured by that instructor so that one-third of the lectures were delivered by TAs, leaving only two-thirds of the main instruction by Dave. I want to emphasize that Dave stepped up to help the area out of a particularly difficult teaching assignment situation given the course that was involved, even though it meant that his own schedule was upended at the last minute.
- He doesn't note this but he spends a lot of time identifying teaching trends and helping the area keep its curriculum up-to-date

Each of the performance dimensions of teaching, research and service is evaluated on a 10 point scale. Scores of 0-1.5 are in the exceptionally poor range; 2.0-4.5 Needs Improvement; 5.0-8.0 Meets Professional Standards; and 8.5-10.0 Truly Superlative.

• The university's salary guidelines provided a merit increase pool of 2.5% for the 2019-2020 academic year. The Dean's office asked us to target a 2.2 % average raise and use the remaining 0.3% to target faculty with significant success. The raises for this year reflect the implementation of this directive. As such, Dave's merit % increase will be 3.20%.
